- We have briefed the Panel on 18 December 2000 regarding our plans to update the arrangements and guidelines for employment of non-civil service contract (NCSC) staff. In this regard, we have promulgated the updated arrangements and guidelines in a revised circular issued on 9 January 2001.
- In issuing the revised circular, we have taken the opportunity to clarify the scope of the NCSC scheme and remind heads of department that they should not employ NCSC staff for jobs which should be undertaken by civil servants on a long-term basis, especially if they see a continued need for permanent staffing by civil servants to meet the service needs of their departments in the long run. We will continue to monitor the situation of employment of NCSC staff by departments.
- Regarding the question of whether the service of teachers serving in government schools on non-civil service contract terms could be counted towards the three-year probationary period, we are studying the issue and the implications and will give a reply as soon as we have reached a conclusion.
