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Aims

- Interrupt transmission
- Identify the source
- Isolate the case
- Detect further cases for early treatment & isolation



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Legal basis (1)

- International Health Regulations
- Quarantine and Prevention of Disease Ordinance (Cap 141) & Prevention of the Spread of Infectious Diseases Regulations (Cap 141B)
 - SARS added to First Schedule



Legal basis (2)

- Powers invoked under Cap 141B
 - Require notification
 - Examine
 - Remove
 - Treat
 - Detain
 - Disinfect buildings & conveyances
 - Order premises to be isolated
 - Check temperature at border control points



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Co-ordination of Control Actions Permanent Secretary for Health, Welfare and Food Department of Health Disease surveillance, contact tracing Containment of disease via public health and environmental hygiene measures Co-ordination of multi-disciplinary teams for investigation and following-up Distribution of clinical specimens, reference laboratory service Other Government Departments Assist in public health actions e.g. education, home confinement, environmental investigation, etc.

Control Measures (1)

- 1. Surveillance
- 2. Laboratory diagnosis
- 3. Contact tracing
- 4. Designated medical centres
- 5. Home confinement



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Control Measures (2)

- 6. Multidisciplinary response
- 7. Border control
- Communication & public education
- Infection control advice & guidance
- 10. Collaboration with WHO, Mainland & others



Multidisciplinary response (MDR)

- Led by DH involving Buildings
 Department, Housing Department,
 Food & Environmental Hygiene
 Department, Police & others
- Structural and environmental factors
- MIIDSS -> command post -> RO -> MDR



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Proactive investigative and remedial actions triggered by MIIDSS

- Before the remedial actions, Food and Environmental Hygiene Department would take environmental swab samples for further analysis.
- Department of Health conducted further on-site interviews with residents









Proactive investigative and remedial actions triggered by MIIDSS

- Food and Environmental Hygiene Department, Housing Department and/or Buildings Department would inspect the general cleanliness and sewage and drainage systems of the buildings.
- Electrical and Mechanical Services Department would inspect the ventilation system.



Proactive investigative and remedial actions triggered by MIIDSS

 After proactive investigations, Food and Environmental Hygiene Department, Housing Department, Buildings Department and/or Drainage Services Department would initiate immediate remedial actions including cleansing, disinfection and pest disinfestations.



Multidisciplinary response (MDR)

- Swift investigation & control
 - From 26 March Amoy, Koway, Tung Tau
 - From 18 April 2 or more admissions
 - From 13 May single confirmed case
 - From 3 June single suspected case



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Port Health Measures

- Health declaration
- Temperature checking
- Medical posts on site
- "Stop list" implemented at immigration control points
 - Close contacts of confirmed and suspected SARS patients are barred from leaving Hong Kong during the isolation period.



Health Declaration

- Passengers and crews are required to complete a health declaration form
 - Departing and arriving Hong Kong via the HKIA
 - All arrivals at other control points



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Results

- more than 1,930 travellers reported sick on their declarations since 29 March 2003.
- 79 (4.1%) of them required hospital referral
- 23 were admitted
- 2 were confirmed to have SARS



Temperature Check at the Airport

• For in-bound, out-bound and transit passengers and crews







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 Conjoint screening programme with Mainland counterparts to screen arriving passengers at land control points





Comprehensive temperature checks at other control points

- Include :
 - Passengers
 Drivers
 Ferry Crew
 members



Results of temperature checking

- 2.2 M passengers & crew screened at HKIA
- 13 M passengers & crew screened at land and seaports
- No confirmed cases so far



Health Awareness Programme

- To further ensure no export or import of cases
- To restore confidence of travelers and foreign businessmen
 - Measures target at
 - Travelers: in-bound and out-boun
 - Hotel operators and staff
 - Tour operators and guides







Port health measures

- No export of cases since end of March 2003
- Travel advisory against Hong Kong by WHO was lifted since 23 May 2003





Avoid touching public installations Keep your hands to yourself, for the good of your health


Wash your hands:

Prevention of Pest Infestation



If Feeling Unwell...

- Consult the doctor promptly if you develop symptoms of respiratory tract infections or if you have a fever
- Parents should not send sick children to school or nursery
- Patients who have respiratory illness should wear a mask to prevent spread of infection
- The chance of recovery is better if it is detected and treated early
- SARS patients should be hospitalized for medical treatment






Team Clean



- Team Clean, the special task force chaired by the Chief Secretary for Administration, is established to promote a sustainable, cross-sectoral approach to improve environmental hygiene in Hong Kong
- Zero-tolerance of littering, spitting and other unhygienic behaviour





Step-wise introduction of sustained public health actions

- Reduced population contact
- Early admission/case isolation
- Reduced transmission
